A CRASH COURSE ON... GENDER AND MIDWIFERY

Tanzanian midwives are dedicated to ensuring the health of girls, women and children. However their commitment has always been challenged by one determinant that we tend to forget.

This determinant is gender. Gender can be defined broadly by the social and cultural role of females and males in a given society. How do the differences between these roles affect maternal and newborn care?


First of all, men are generally the ones who possess control over resources, making it harder for pregnant women to access health facilities and to purchase the necessary health supplies without the support of a husband or a male family member. Second, the division of labour that generally expects Tanzanian women to take-on all domestic work can be especially risky for pregnant women. Finally, the lack of power in the decision making process that result from gender inequalities makes it very hard for a woman to choose the way she wants to give birth, such as delivering with the help of a trained midwife.

Let's remember gender norms are not fixed and can always change. As male and female midwives, what can we do to help change these norms?

Location: Bariadi, Simiyu Region

After months of planning and coordinating with partners across Tanzania, IDM 2019 is finally complete, and we're pleased to announce that it was one of TAMA's most successful events to date. The theme of this year's IDM was **Midwives**: **Defenders of Women's Rights**, and hundreds of IDM celebrations around the world used this theme to acknowledge the essential role midwives play in advocating for a range of reproductive health issues. Here are a few of the **highlights from TAMA's celebration in Bariadi, Simiyu Region**:

- TAMA kicked-off the IDM (May 5) with a rally comprised of hundreds of midwives, a brass marching band, and local nursing and midwifery students who marched through the streets of Bariadi spreading awareness about the importance of accessing care from a competent midwife before, during and after pregnancy
- After the rally, various speakers including, the President of TAMA, the
 Deputy Country Representative of United Nations Population Fund, Dr.
 Hashina Begum, and the Deputy Minister of Health, The Hon. Faustine
 Ndungulile spoke to the crowd about the state of midwifery in Tanzania
- In his speech, The Hon. Faustine Ndungulile urged TAMA and like-minded organizations to scale up efforts to reach more midwives in more regions of Tanzania.

KEY PROJECTS UPDATE (MARCH - JULY)

Midwives Save Lives - Project Head: Martha Rimoy

Recently through the Midwives Save Lives Project, Tanzania Midwives Association Executive Committee members met in Morogoro to develop strategies for strengthening the Association. The activity was conducted jointly with representatives from the Canadian Association of Midwives. During this meeting, TAMA President, Feddy Mwanga informed the members of the achievements made by TAMA including; an increased number of TAMA Branches since January 2019 (growing concurrently with increase in TAMA members), increased visibility of TAMA country wide, and more partners/stakeholders showing interest to work and collaborate TAMA.

50,000 Happy Birthdays - Project Head: Lucy Mabada

Tanzania Midwives Association in partnership with the International Confederation of Midwives (ICM) and funding from Laerdal Global Health (LGH) has started implementing the "50,000 Happy Birthdays Project" that focuses on strengthening health care providers' competencies in saving lives at birth. During this reporting quarter (April - June), we have managed to train 697 participants (266 participants were trained on HMS, 431 participants on HBS training — see below for details on each program).

Helping Mothers Survive (HMS)

The four days Competence-Based skills training, conducted in five regions (Katavi, Geita, Tanga, Dar-es-salaam and Coast region). Those trained in these courses will then lead training in their own facilities. The emphasis is to provide updates on maternal care and translate participants' knowledge into skills through demonstration in classroom settings, and an objective structured clinical examination (OSCE) in a skills laboratory under close supervision of facilitators.

Helping Babies Survive (HBS)

The three-day Helping Babies Survive training was delivered to education institutions during this reporting quarter with the goal of empowering students to become trainers on the subject. The students' acquired knowledge and skills, through demonstrations, practice simulation and OSCE under close supervision of facilitators.

TAMA AND THE PPIUD PROJECT

From 2013, FIGO (International Federation of Gynecology and Obstetrics) has worked through national partners in six countries to institutionalise the provision of postpartum IUD (PPIUD) services into routine maternity care.

In Tanzania, TAMA is FIGO's official partner for the implementation of the PPIUD Project. Midwives were involved from the beginning of the project. During its implementation, a study was conducted to explore contributions made by midwives in provision of PPIUD services in Tanzania. This study found that training midwives to provide immediate PPIUD has more potential to improve access to PPIUD services than relying on doctors. Furthermore, the complication rates when immediate PPIUD is provided by midwives are comparable to those when provided by experienced physicians. Through this study, it was discovered that 93% of PPIUD insertions following normal deliveries were done by midwives.

In Tanzania, through project advocacy, PPIUD is now included in pre-service training for healthcare providers.
